Active learning is the foundation of Moore Museum's education programming. Students are engaged in activities which promote a deeper level of understanding.

As students interact with first person interpreters in historical buildings, surrounded by artifacts, they are able to compare various aspects of their lives to those of early settlers.

Many programs are designed for use with grade 3 Social Studies Heritage and Identity: Communities in Canada 1780-1850. Additional curriculum connections make these programs suitable for classes from JK/SK through grade four.





The cost for any program is \$4.50/student (HST included). There is a minimum charge of 10 students. Teachers and adults accompanying the group are free of charge.

Each program is approximately 2 hours long, and must be booked one week in advance. Please let the staff know when booking if the class needs to stay after the program for a lunch or snack break.

APPLES

Learn about how the early settlers prepared for the winter months, and their relationship to the environment as they planted, tended to, harvested and prepared food.

This program includes a visit to the log cabin where you can see the tools and resources that were available to pioneers, an activity in the Shaw Exhibition Building, creating an apple themed craft in our main building and enjoying an apple treat to finish off the day.

COMMUNITY HELPERS

Tour the entire heritage village with costumed interpreters and give students the opportunity to learn about the life and work of the settlers. Visit the homes, general store, blacksmith shop, railroad station, historic chapel and more.

Choose a craft or activity to add to your visit. Options include rope making, churning butter, and completing a slate board lesson in the one-room schoolhouse.

CHILDHOOD MEMORIES

This is an activity based program your students will long remember. Visits are made to the log cabin and Victorian cottage where students learn about children's lives during each time period, including playing some games of the day. Students attend the oneroom school to learn proper 19th century behaviour and try a lesson on a slate.

In line with Kindergarten objectives to provide engaging activities in a new setting to assist in further developing such skills as communicating, demonstrating independence and awareness of built and natural environments.

Works well with the Grade 3 objectives to compare and contrast daily life for early settler children and children today in Social Studies.

BACK TO SCHOOL

Role-playing pioneer students in an authentic one-room schoolhouse will transport your students back in time. Students will learn about schoolroom set up, subjects studied, discipline and school equipment, all within the walls of a real one-room schoolhouse. as they practice their penmanship with ink and quill and copy their arithmetic questions from blackboard to slate, students learn first-hand the challenges and enjoyments of one-room schoolhouses.

COMMUNITY HOLIDAY CELEBRATIONS

Traditions of the world arrive with the settlers! Enjoy a visit to our log cabin, decorated for a pioneer family holiday, the fun of an old-time taffy pull, a tour highlighting decorations and the celebrations of the various countries from which early settlers arrived in our community, & create a decoration to take home.

In line with Kindergarten objectives to provide engaging activities in a new setting to assist in further developing such skills as communicating, demonstrating independence and awareness of built and natural environments.

Grade 2 students will learn about holiday traditions in line with the Social Studies topic Changing Family and Community Traditions. Also covers topics related to Grade 3 Social Studies strand Heritage and Identity: Communities in Canada, 1780-1850.

BUSY AT HOME

The work of pioneer life becomes real for students as they learn to fetch water in wooden buckets, wash clothes on a scrub board, and dip candles by hand. Spending time in the log cabin allows students to see first hand many of the objects they are learning about in studying settler life. This is an excellent active living learning program, with many outdoor chores.

Victorian Children's Day of Fun
