Many programs are designed for use with grade 3 Social Studies Heritage and Identity: Communities in Canada, 1780-1850. Additional curriculum connections also enrich the experience to make these suitable for split students from kindergarten to grade 4.

Cost for any one program is \$4.50/student (minimum charge is for 10 students, maximum 50 students). Teachers and parents are free.
